
Stz'uminus Environmental Stewardship Technicians have identified *Alexandrium spp*. phytoplankton near our beaches which can cause <u>Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning</u> in people when contaminated shellfish are consumed.

Harvest and consumption are not recommended.
 <u>All Shellfish Harvested</u> in the past week should be frozen and labeled: "Not for Consumption until Tested" with the date or should be thrown out.
 If you have consumed any shellfish recently, monitor for the following signs and symptoms:

Potenital symptoms include: -Spreading tingling and numbness. -Headache, dizziness, nausea, vomiting. -In severe cases, choking sensation, loss of control of arms and legs, muscle paralysis, difficulty breathing. -Death occurs when muscles used for breathing are paralyzed.

Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning Symptoms can start within 30 minutes after eating contaminated shellfish or delays up to 12 hours after consuming.

Stz'uminus First Nation recommends members do not harvest or consume until further notice.



National Indigenous PEOPLES DAY CELEBRATION

Indigenous communities across the nation come together to commemorate National Indigenous Peoples Day.

Vibrant colors, rhythmic drumbeats, and an atmosphere filled with pride and unity marked the National Indigenous Peoples Day celebration held Wednesday, June 21 in Ladysmith.

The event, organized by Stz'uminus First Nation, took place at Transfer Beach and drew a diverse crowd of both Indigenous and non-Indigenous attendees. The festivities began early in the morning, as participants and onlookers gathered for the official opening ceremony, which featured traditional prayers and speeches from community leaders.

"We are coming together as a community to build relationships and form bonds that will carry us through the challenge of our time. As a generation, we work through the challenges of our past but embrace a bright future together. We are here today to share in fun, food and celebration of culture and traditions so that we can learn more about each other and embrace the path that is in front of us."-Mayor Stone





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Throughout the day, the event offered a wide array of activities, performances, and educational opportunities, allowing attendees to engage with and appreciate the Indigenous culture. Artisans and crafters proudly displayed their creations, including intricate beadwork, traditional carving, and exquisite handmade jewelry. Visitors had the chance to purchase these unique items while conversing with the artists, gaining insight into the artistic traditions passed down through generations.

Traditional songs and dancing were at the heart of the celebration, with performances by the Cowichan Tzinquaw Dancers and the Stz'uminus



Young Wolves captivating the audience. The rhythmic beat of the drums resonated through the venue as traditional songs were sung, and dancers adorned in stunning regalia gracefully performed ancestral dances. These expressions of Indigenous culture provided a powerful reminder of the resilience and strength of Indigenous communities throughout history. This event offered valuable opportunities for cross-cultural dialogue and a chance to challenge misconceptions and stereotypes.

One of the highlights of the day was the traditional feast, where participants gathered

to enjoy a variety of Indigenous foods such as sockeye salmon and fried bread. The flavors and aromas delighted the taste buds of all who attended. This communal meal fostered a sense of unity and shared appreciation for Indigenous culinary traditions.

Throughout the performance, attendees were encouraged to actively participate and join the songs and dances.

The National Indigenous Peoples Day celebration in Ladysmith not only honored our rich cultural heritage but also provided an opportunity for healing and reconciliation. By bringing together people from diverse backgrounds, the event served



as a platform to foster understanding, respect, and appreciation for the Indigenous peoples' contributions to the fabric of our nation.

Stz'uminus wanted to help an organization that provides a lot of assistance to our members. This year we chose the Loaves and Fishes Food Bank. They received a total of \$941.95. Island Savings matched the donation for a total of \$1883.90. With that donation, Loaves & Fishes explained that they are able to buy \$5 worth of food for every \$1 that is donated. That makes the total donation equal to \$9419.50 worth of food they are now able to purchase. Thank you to everyone that made a donation.









New Stz'uminus School

Building the new Primary School for Stz'uminus First Nation has taken a long time. The project started in 2016 but moved slowly until 2022 when it picked up speed. In November 2022, they asked for the final design application. They had a meeting in January 2023 to start the project and manage the finances. In February 2023, they visited a building and had a design meeting. They made changes to the floor plan. In March 2023, they had a meeting with the community and reviewed a revised floor plan. The design work continued. In April 2023, they reviewed the floor plan again. In May 2023, they finished the draft design and sent it for cost estimation.

This project is important for Stz'uminus Education Society, and we can't wait to see it completed! This project will monitor closely the progress of the SFN Cassidy aquifer project.

The Capital Project Summary showcases the significant progress made in various capital projects within the Stz'uminus community. The Field Turf upgrade nears completion, promising an exciting opportunity for Stz'uminus to utilize a remarkable field. The new playground for the Primary School is almost finished, with its completion date approaching. The student-led Library design project reflects the meaningful contributions of Stz'uminus students, providing a welcoming space that celebrates Coast Salish design and incorporates the needs and wants of the community. Finally, the construction of the new Primary School, after a slow start, has gained momentum, and various stages of the project have been successfully accomplished. These projects collectively demonstrate the commitment to enhancing educational and recreational facilities for the benefit of the Stz'uminus community.

Greetings Stz'uminus,

Spring has been a busy and exciting time at Stz'uminus Education Society! We've had graduations and convocations, and we've been busy planning fun summer activities for our community. We're also making some changes to our facilities with construction work happening.

As we say goodbye to some of our staff members who are moving on to new opportunities, we want to express our gratitude for their dedication to our learners. This is also a time when our students are moving on to their next adventures, and we're so grateful to have had the opportunity to work with them. We're excited to continue working with your families in the future!

In this newsletter, we have two special parts for you. First, check out the exciting summer programs we have lined up. And second, we'll give you an update on the construction and upgrade projects happening within Stz'uminus Education Society. Get ready for some great news!

Summer Programs

In the summer of 2023, several exciting activities are planned for the Stz'uminus community. First, there is the Indigenous Skills Link Workshop, taking place from July 17 to July 21at the Stz'uminus Education Administration. This one-week program aims to inspire participants to shift their routines, connect with others, and explore indigenous skills. Another event is the Hope & Health Summer Program, running from July 6th to August 17th at the Stz'uminus Community School. This customdesigned outdoor learning program offers a wide range of activities, including recreation, culture, art, play, wellness, and education. Open to children aged 5 and above, the program is led by coaches and special guests, providing a dynamic summer experience. Field trips and daily meals are included.

For students in grades 10 to 12, there is the Gr. 10-12 Summer School focusing on "Family & Society 10" with Coast Salish Carving and Storytelling. Running from July 10th to July 28th at Thuqmin, the program explores problemsolving, ethical considerations, and the use of different technologies while integrating Coast Salish traditions.

The Bladerunners Program, starting in the last week of school and continuing throughout the summer, offers an excellent opportunity for recent graduates or adults interested in learning carpentry and life skills. The program takes place at the Stz'uminus Community Centre and facilitates a smooth transition into a summer routine. For more information, individuals can contact Glenn or Stephen.

Finally, the All Nations Driving School offers classes for Class 7L (Learners) and Class 4L licenses. The timing of these classes will be determined based on the number of registrations received.

Capital Projects

The Capital Project Summary highlights several ongoing projects within the Stz'uminus community.

These projects include the Field Turf upgrade, the construction of a new playground for the Primary School, the design of a student-led Library, and the progress made in building the new Primary School.

These initiatives demonstrate the collaborative efforts of the Stz'uminus Education Society in creating enhanced facilities for the community's benefit.

Field Turf Update

We're almost done with upgrading our full-size synthetic turf! Cedar Crest finished the civil engineering work on Tuesday, June 20, 2023, and Astro Turf installers will be done by June 27, 2023.

We're really excited about this fantastic field for Stz'uminus to use. It was a project that Stz'uminus First Nation, Stz'uminus Education Society, and SFN Health Department worked on together.

Playground

The new playground for our Primary School is almost finished. The last thing we need to do is install the Engineered Wood fibre product. Students should be able to use the playground starting on July 15, 2023.







LIBRARY RENOVATION

We're happy to announce that our long-awaited library renovation is going ahead! As of June 5th, the Stz'uminus Community Schools Library will be closed for renovations. We will be re-opening our updated library at the beginning of next school year. We're incredibly excited for our refreshed space and can't wait to share it with you in September 2023! This renovation will move us several steps closer to our goal of becoming a library not just for the school but for the whole Stz'uminus community.

Our updated library will include:

- comfortable seating areas for readers of all ages,
- a soft area specifically for the under 5's,
- a media booth to support audio/video recording and language work,
- increased flexibility to accommodate a wide range of library and community programs.





Welcome Joanna into the Infant Program. She brings calmness and love to the environment and children!



Fisheries Field Skills Course Highlights



The Environmental Stewardship Technicians and a couple community members completed the two-week Fisheries Field Skills Certificate Program. We would like to thank the instructors from the Natural Resource Training Group (NRTG) for the experience and skills we've learned.

- We completed our field training in local creeks including Bush Creek, Holland Creek, Stocking Creek, Haslam Creek, and Walker Creek.
- During field training we saw coho, sculpin, stickleback, and trout. We also documented previous habitat restorations projects.
- Received our Electrofishing certification.
- Learned how to evaluate fish habitat, complete a site card (evaluating the site, or creeks), and about habitat restoration techniques and planning. Enabling us to plan future restoration works.

These skills and certifications will be useful for future projects for Stz'uminus such as the start of collecting data in the hopes to restore our local, sacred creeks that empty into Kulleet Bay. As for the other participants it has provided skills and opportunities for employment or to start projects of their own in their community.


WATCH Program

We All Take Care of the Harvest

As part of the Watch Program the Environmental Stewardship Technicians weekly monitor four locations for plankton species which can release toxins responsible for shellfish poisoning as well as other species which can cause harmful algae blooms.

Currently, we are developing a response plan to the presence of plankton species that can be harmful to human health when found at high concentrations in our waters. Increasing risk of paralytic, amnesic and diarrhetic shellfish poisoning.

Expect an update in our next newsletter on how any increased risk observed will be communicated to help keep community members healthy.






Image: A plankton species documented these past weeks by our Environmental Stewardship Technicians.

Noctiluca Scintillans- When blooming this bioluminescent heterotrophic plankton causes the water to appear like orange soup. These blooms produce ammonia, sometimes killing marine life including shellfish in the vicinity.

Resilient Shoreline for Salmon Workshop

On June 20, Stz'uminus community members took place in the Resilient Shoreline for Salmon Workshop which outlined how modifications such as human-created structures affect shorelines. The workshop gave community members the opportunity to collect and record data on abandoned vessels, ghost gear, log booms, piers, boat ramps and other structures that impact fish habitats. With changing climates, and sea level fluctuations, mapping shoreline data becomes increasingly important.

"The aim is for all sites to achieve a Green Shores for Shoreline Development "Gold" Rating, the highest standard of nature-based Green Shores certification for shoreline development projects." Resilient Shoreline for Salmon Workshop also works with restoration sites on neighboring Indigenous lands such as Songhees and Esquimalt.

These surveys will collect biological information on Manila, Littleneck and Butter Clams like density, biomass, age, and size. June 19th will be for planning while actual surveys will occur July 5th and 6th.

Marine Data collection by Terra Remote



On June 6 the Terra Remote marine team began canvassing the shoreline and bays, collecting underwater information including old vessels and ghost gear in hopes of future removal. This will continue, on and off through July and August..

CANADA LEARNING BOND

Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) provides an additional incentive of up to \$2,000 to help low-income families start saving early for their child's education after high school (post-secondary education).

The Canada Learning Bond (CLB) money will be deposited directly into the child's RESP.

The CLB is available for eligible children from low-income families born in 2004 or later and provides an initial payment of \$500 for the first year the child is eligible, plus \$100 for each additional year of eligibility, up to age 15, for a maximum of \$2,000. Personal contributions are not required to receive the CLB. To help cover the cost of opening an RESP, ESDC will pay \$25 into the RESP to which the initial CLB of \$500 is deposited in recognition of a one-time incidental expense that may be associated with opening the RESP account.

Children who are in care of a public primary caregiver for whom a special allowance under the Children's Special Allowance Act is paid, are also entitled to the CLB.

The beneficiary must be under the age of 21 at the time of application.

If the beneficiary does not pursue post-secondary education, the CLB is returned to the government.


